

# REGENTS' SCHOLARS

## FACTS & FIGURES 2022-2023

First awarded in Fall 2004, the Regents' Scholarship is designed to assist first-generation college students achieve their education goals. Between 700 and 1,000 eligible freshman students receive up to \$6,000, which is renewable up to four years pending Satisfactory Academic Progress and the completion of Regents' Scholars Program requirements. Academic support for Regents' Scholars is coordinated through the Office for Student Success.

be a Texas resident

be a first generation college student

have a family adjusted gross income less than \$40,000

completed the FAFSA or TASFA and have financial need

## Regents' Scholar Program Requirements

### 1. Live on campus during the first year

Regents' Scholars who live on campus build community, take advantage of leadership opportunities, and connect with the Routh First-Generation Center's staff on campus.

### 2. Attend the Regents' Scholars Orientation

### 3. Attend the Regents' Scholars Spring Reception

### 4. Participate in an Academic Success Program

Regents' Scholars participate in an Academic Success Program as designated by their college during their first year at Texas A&M. Success programs provide first year students the best academic start for college and provide skills and knowledge to excel in their academic, professional, and personal lives. Programs typically have designated courses, out-of-classroom learning experiences, social and service activities, and peer or faculty mentors.
